#### Our Goals for Student Achievement

Language Arts - Kindergarten students will read a variety of texts identifying details and main events and respond to the text verbally and in all forms of writing. By the end of Kindergarten, students will know and name all letters and identify and spell some common words.

Math - By the end of Kindergarten, students will learn to count to 100 by ones. and by tens and write numbers to 20. Beginning addition and subtraction starts in Kindergarten. Students will sort and classify objects and identify basic shapes.

> Included in this compact are goals the county has set to prepare our students for college and/or careers. There is also a description of what to expect for your child's grade in ELA and Math.

Math- The Howard County Public School System has adopted the Maryland College and Career-Ready Standards Curriculum. The mathematics curriculum will teach students: counting and cardinality; operations and algebraic thinking; number and operations in base ten; measurement and data; and geometry.

Reading- All elementary grades will be taught the Maryland College and Career-Ready Standards English Language Arts Curriculum. These grade-by-grade standards in reading, writing, speaking and listening, and language create a steady progression of development leading to college and career readiness by the end of high school.

The Title I Office creates and distributes a calendar every quarter that describes the Family Programs and Events offered for PLES families. Beyond Thursday folders, we upload the document to the PLES website.




